Campus Reminders

Holiday Safety

Since we are now in the Holiday season it is a good time to remind students of the importance of being safe when they are out and about in the community (walking to and from school, playing at the park, walking in the mall, etc.) and what they should do if they run into a problem. Students should travel in groups or walk with an adult. Students should not talk to any unknown individuals not matter how nice they may seem. Students should never accept a ride, gift, or treat from any unknown individuals. If your child reports something to you that brings concern, be calm, listen, and guide your child through what happened in order to determine what to do next. If you feel it is a serious matter, contact the Ventura County Sheriff's Department Dispatch at 805 - 654 - 9511.

EMAIL ETIQUETTE

Email is often a convenient and helpful way to communicate with your child's teacher. Unfortunately, an email's message can get misconstrued depending on how it is written and/or how the reader of the email interprets the text. In order to avoid this unfortunate miscommunication please see the list of helpful hints below.

Be aware that teachers get many email messages and have many other responsibilities during their day, so they may not be able to respond immediately to yours.

Identify your child and what your concerns are. Include a phone number where you can be reached if needed.

Be diplomatic. You can't take back an email message, and email can be easily forwarded. Be calm, choose your words carefully, and avoid criticizing the teacher. Don't write and send an email when you are angry. Give yourself time to reflect on the big picture before you click send.

Be brief and stick to the point.

Use upper and lower case, not all caps (that's considered shouting). Stick to school-related matters. Don't forward chain mail, jokes, or frivolous information; as these can contain hidden viruses.

Don't forward someone else's email, including a teacher's, unless you have permission from the writer/originator to do so.

FLU REMINDER

As we move forward into the winter/flu season, please remember to follow the guidelines below in order to insure we are all practicing proper hygiene and doing our part to help prevent the spread of the flu.

(1) Wash hands with soap and water for 20-30 seconds, especially after coughing and sneezing. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol based hand sanitizer. (2) Cover the nose and mouth with tissue or arm when coughing or sneezing. (3) Avoid touching eyes, nose or mouth. (4) Do not share food, drinks or eating utensils. (5) Avoid close contact with someone who is ill. Individuals with symptoms should stay home for at least 24 hours after they have no fever following discontinued use of fever-reducing medicines. If your child is experiencing these symptoms and will be absent from school please make sure to call the office to let us know they will be out and if you would like to pick up missed work.

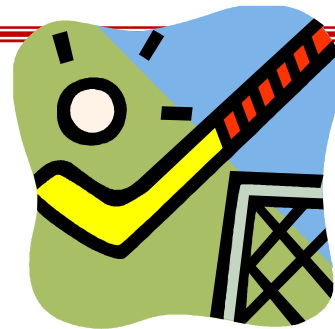
LOST AND FOUND

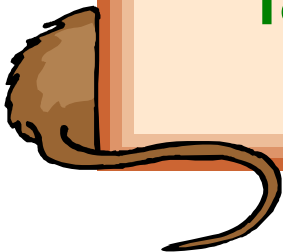
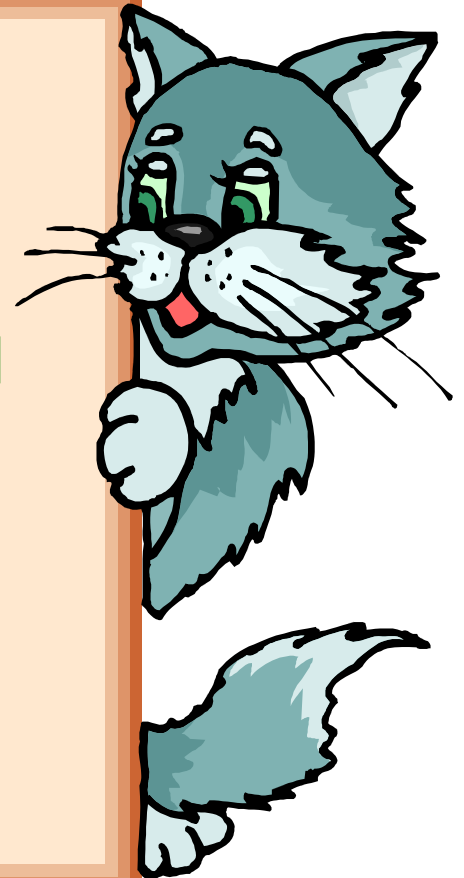

Kids and Self-Esteem: How to Help Them Grow a Thicker Skin

It starts so young these days – much earlier than I remember. Our kids come home fragile and in tears, basing their happiness on these fickle, yet pivotal interactions. I see it more with my girls. (My boys are perhaps still too immature to care, although I believe boys and girls are wired differently.)

It's inescapable and part of the process of maturation. Private schools, religious schools, charter schools, A-rated, B-rated — it's all the same. Kids are kids. Many root their self-esteem in how they measure up against their peers. And deep insecurity, or rather, underdeveloped self-confidence compels them to berate one another to bolster their own social status.

It's heart-wrenching for us parents who have to witness this from the sidelines. Yet the more we fight our children's battles and try to intervene, the more we hamper the growth of their self-esteem and independence, in the long run. The answer? We must learn how to refrain, unless it's a matter of safety or health.

I remember going through this myself. It was a living nightmare and at age 10, I went from a straight-A student to barely passing from one semester to the next. One day my mother came to school, marching right into the cafeteria during lunchtime, and attempted to take on the entire clique of mean girls. My face turned crimson and hot as she angrily accused them all, one by one, of ganging up on her daughter. I was mortified.

In fact, after that incident, it got so bad that my parents accompanied me one night to the private home of the County Superintendent. They begged him to allow me to attend another school, one out of our designated district. We were denied. I wanted to disappear.

It was the best thing that could have ever happened. Yet, I didn't know it at the time.

I was forced to adapt, to mature.

To survive socially, I implemented new strategies. I proactively sought out the "other" kids — the quieter, loyal and less-popular bunch. They embraced me wholeheartedly and didn't ask many questions. These girls became my true friends and I learned invaluable lessons that I try to impart upon my kids today.

Each night before bed, I coax my girls into venting about all the stressful interactions that ultimately define whether their day was a success or a failure. I persuade them to articulate their feelings. Much of their frustrations are locked away and only once home, and feeling safe, can they release it all. Sometimes they write it down. Regardless, I listen and nod my head. Once they finish regurgitating all the painful memories, I put on my "motivational speaker hat" and give them a serious pep talk. Night after night. And each morning I do it again as they leave for school.

Yes, I want them to be kind and recognize the emotional damage caused by vicious gossip. Moreover, I

want them to develop rock-solid self-esteem that enables them to see through the insults – right into the heart of the frightened, insecure child that utters them.

“Perhaps this kid’s parents don’t love them enough,” I reason, “Or encourage them enough, or believe in them.”

I want my kids to feel compassion for the mean kids. Because then, they’ll grow impermeable to such hurtful attacks; they’ll remain stoic and unfrazzled.

Because it doesn’t end when the bell rings or at graduation. Unfortunately.

That’s why I want them to be TOUGH.

“You are a leader. You are a winner. Put up that invisible wall and be courteous, but keep the conversation light. Don’t allow their words to penetrate your heart.”

“Trust me,” I assure them. “Many of today’s so-called popular, bad-mouthing kids will have a hard time in life later on. The good-natured children, the ones that stay neutral and loyal, will become your future community leaders.”

With a combination of love, straight-talk, and role-playing, they get it.

And, as their mom, I endeavor to model positive behavior coupled with a strong character.

For parents, our workshop is our home and that is where we must support, coach and train our kids. And because kids learn what they see in the home, I know their chances of evolving into mindful, self-confident adults are that much greater.

Your elementary counseling team would also like to share that about 75-80% of our conversations need to be positive in nature with our children. While we want our children to share those difficult stories with us, we don’t want our children to feel that they will only get our undivided attention from sharing problems. During those heartfelt conversations, it is also important to not allow our children to stay stuck in the problem. We should be talking about ways to solve the problem. That’s where self-esteem comes from is solving some of life’s problems. You can reference the elementary counseling program called, “Kelso’s Choices” to help your child solve conflicts.

Niños y la Estima Personal: Como ayudarles a ser más fuertes

Comienza a una edad muy temprana estos días- mucho más adelantado de lo que yo recuerdo. Nuestros niños llegan a casa, frágiles y en llanto, basando su felicidad en estas interacciones inconstantes, y de cambio. Lo veo más en mis niñas. (Mis niños quizá todavía sean muy inmaduros para tomarle importancia, aunque creo que los niños y las niñas están cableados de diferente forma.)

No se puede escapar y es parte del proceso de la maduración. Escuelas privadas, escuelas religiosas, escuelas charter, clasificada-A, clasificada-B – todo es lo mismo. Los niños son niños. Muchos hacen raíz de su estima personal en como se miden en comparación a sus compañeros. Y de una profunda inseguridad, o aún de la falta del desarrollo de la confianza en sí mismos les obliga a reñir uno con otro para aumentar su propio nivel social.

Se nos achica el corazón como padres ya que tenemos que ser testigos de esto desde un lado. Entre más luchemos las batallas de nuestros hijos y tratemos de intervenir, más atrasaremos el crecimiento de su estima personal y de su independencia a largo plazo. ¿La respuesta? Tenemos que abstenernos, a menos de que sea un asunto de seguridad o de salud.

Recuerdo atravesar por esto yo misma. Era una pesadilla y a la edad de 10 fui de ser una estudiante con A en todo a casi no aprobar de un semestre a otro. Un día mi mamá vino a la escuela, marchando directo a la cafetería durante la hora del almuerzo, y trató de caerles al grupo entero de niñas crueles. Mi cara enrojeció y se puso caliente mientras ella muy enojada las acusó a todas, una por una, de juntarse en grupo para molestar a su hija. Yo estaba mortificada.

Es mas, después de ese incidente, se puso tan mal que mis padres me acompañaron una noche al hogar privado del superintendente del condado. Ellos le suplicaron que me permitiera atender a otra escuela, una fuera de nuestro distrito designado. Nos fue negado. Yo quise desaparecer.

Fue lo mejor que pudo haber pasado. Aunque yo no lo sabía en ese momento.

Fui forzada a adaptarme, a madurar.

Para sobrevivir socialmente, implementé estrategias nuevas. Y de manera activa busqué a los “otras” niñas, las más calladas, leales y menos populares de todas. Ellas me cobijaron con todo el corazón y no hicieron muchas preguntas. Estas niñas se volvieron mis amigas verdaderas y aprendí lecciones invaluable que trato de impartir a mis niños el día de hoy.

Cada noche antes de ir a la cama, animo a mis niñas para ventilar todo acerca de las interacciones estresantes que en última instancia definen si su día fue exitoso o un fracaso. Las persuado para articular sus

sentimientos. Muchas de sus frustraciones están encerradas y solamente una vez ya en casa, y sintiéndose seguras, pueden sacarlo todo. A veces lo escriben. Prescindiendo de hacer caso, escucho y asiento con la cabeza. Una vez que han terminado de sacar todas las memorias dolorosas, me pongo mi “sombrero de orador motivacional” y les doy una charla seria motivadora. Noche tras noche. Y cada mañana lo hago nuevamente al irse a la escuela.

Sí, quiero que sean amables y que reconozcan el daño emocional por el feroz chisme. Además, quiero que ellas desarrollen una estima personal sólida como una roca que les permita ver a través de los insultos- directo al corazón del niño/a asustado e inseguro que les habla a ellas.

“Quizás estos niños no son lo suficientemente queridos por sus padres,” yo razono, “O motívalos suficientemente, o cree en ellos.”

Quiero que mis niños sientan **compasión** por los niños crueles. Por que así, ellos crecerán impermeabilizados a esos ataques dolorosos; ellos permanecerán fuertes y tranquilos.

Porque no termina cuando la campana suena o en la graduación. Desafortunadamente.

Por eso quiero que se les ENSEÑE.

Con una combinación de amor, conversación directa, y jugar a pretender las situaciones, ellos entienden.

Y como su mamá, procuro modelar comportamiento positivo acompañado de un carácter fuerte.

Para los padres, nuestro taller es nuestro hogar y es en donde debemos apoyar, guiar y entrenar a nuestros niños. Y porque los niños aprenden lo que ven en el hogar, yo sé que sus posibilidades de hacerse adultos pensantes, con confianza en sí mismos son mucho más grandes.

Tu consejería escolar quisiera también compartir que el 75%-80% de nuestras conversaciones necesitan ser positivas con nuestros niños. Mientras queremos que nuestros niños compartan historias difíciles con nosotros, no queremos que nuestros niños se sientan que solamente tienen nuestra atención individual al compartir problemas. Durante esas conversaciones dolorosas, también es importante no permitir a nuestros niños atorarse en el problema. Debemos de hablar acerca de formas para solucionarlo. Es de donde viene la estima personal, de resolver algunos problemas de la vida. Usted puede referirse al programa de consejería de primarias llamado “Kelso’s Choices” para ayudar a su niño a resolver conflictos.



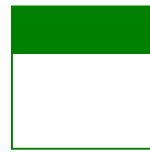
